FROM YOUR TOWN CHAIRMAN

The Board has rescinded a motion made in 2021 to research and implement town-wide garbage service. It was felt that including implementation in that motion would mean the service would be implemented regardless of the cost. A new motion was to research the cost of the possible service was passed and the board will review possible implementation when the cost is established.

On the advice of the Technology Committee with input from Nsight, it was decided not to contract with Finley Services to provide a cost estimate to provide Town-wide broadband access. Nsight, the parent company of Cellcom, has been instrumental in providing broadband in a number of communities. They have used independent companies to perform research and cost estimates. Nsight is currently working with Baileys Harbor, and it is possible they would be the ISP for that service in the Town of Baileys Harbor. We are monitoring the project in Baileys Harbor plus the County's effort at hiring a manager to extend service county-wide.

The time for the former Betty Weborg house to be removed from the Mariner Park location in Gills Rock has been extended to May 1, 2022. The plumbing and electricity to the structure have now been turned off and Stephanie Burke, who purchased the structure, is waiting DOT permits to move the home on Highways 42 and 57. She plans to use the home for attainable housing.

The Board, acting as the Personnel Committee, is currently reviewing the Employee Handbook to reflect the current employee staffing. That review and possible changes should be done by early spring.

At the request of Mike Kahr and Jeff Johnson the Highway Committee is discussing the possibility of creating truck routes on designated Town roads. The Town will be reaching out to other municipalities in northern Door to schedule a Zoom meeting to discuss a collaborative effort on truck routes so there would be consistency from one municipality to another.

NEW DEFIBS4DOORCOUNTY FUNDRAISING EFFORT AIMS TO INCREASE DEFIBRILATOR ACCESS THROUGHOUT DOOR COUNTY \$75,000 Matching Challenge From Anonymous Donor

Door County, WI, February 1, 2022 - Fire departments throughout Door County are calling on the public to help put more automatic external defibrillators (AEDs) in key locations throughout the county and help save lives by donating to the Defibs4DoorCounty campaign.

More than 356,000 people experience <u>out-of-hospital cardiac arrest</u> (OHCA) in the U.S. each year. For every minute that passes without CPR and defibrillation, the <u>chances of survival decrease 7-10%</u>. Quickly shocking the heart of a cardiac arrest patient with an AED can help save their life.

"Access to a defibrillator means that first responders or even bystanders can begin a key lifesaving step before an ambulance arrives," said Chris Hecht, Door County Fire Chiefs Association president. "While not a replacement for calling 9-1-1, it allows patient treatment to start immediately."

AEDs address an important public safety need in a community like Door County that attracts more than 2 million visitors a year, hosts numerous large public events and where nearly 4 in 10 people who live here year-round are 60 or older.

An anonymous \$75,000 donation and matching challenge from a local donor was the catalyst for the fundraising campaign that runs now through Labor Day. The public can help meet the challenge by making donations at www.Defibs4DoorCounty.org, in-person at local North Shore Bank and Nicolet National Bank branches and at any Door County fire station. Checks should be made payable to Defibs4DoorCounty.

If the public fundraising goal of \$75,000 is met, the total amount of \$150,000 would add approximately 80 new AEDs to Door County's current inventory. Along with providing new units to law, fire and EMS responders, wall cabinets with AEDs would be available to schools, places of worship, and businesses and venues that frequently attract large crowds.

Government agencies, including police, fire, emergency services and the Department of Natural Resources, can submit applications for new, not replacement, defibrillators through www.Defibs4DoorCounty.org at this time. The application process will open to other organizations April 1. Recipients of defibrillators must commit to annual maintenance costs and other guidelines listed on the application form.

"We know that a defibrillation delivered by an AED and CPR make a critical difference in helping cardiac arrest patients before an ambulance arrives, especially in a rural area like Door County," said Door County Emergency Services Director Aaron LeClair. "Making AEDs more accessible and part of our public safety cultural will help save lives."

AED and CPR training is available for a nominal fee through the Sister Bay & Liberty Grove Fire Department.

The Door County Fire Chiefs Association works to improve fire safety, education and prevention through partnership and cooperation with organizations throughout the county. The 13-members organization represents 10 fire department and three EMR agencies.

What is the purpose of Defibs4DoorCounty?

- Raise funds to increase the number of automatic external defibrillators (AEDs) in key locations throughout the county and help save lives
- Match an anonymous \$75,000 donation to add approximately 80 new AEDs to Door County's inventory
- Address an important public safety need:
- For every minute that passes without CPR and defibrillation, the chances of survival decrease 7-10%*
- Most cardiac arrests occur in public places are "shockable," making AEDs in public places vital*
- Over 2 million people visit Door County each year**
- 39% of Door County's year-round population is 60 or older***

When is the Defibs4DoorCounty Campaign?

- Fundraising now through Labor Day 2022
- Application process for AEDS is in two phases: February 1 for government agencies and April 1 for other organizations (see below)

Who Can Request An AED?

- Government agencies (police, fire, EMS and DNR, may submit applications for new AEDs starting February 1
- Schools, places of worship, theaters, and venues/businesses with large public gatherings) can apply starting April 1
